## **Activity 2 First Nations Round Table**

**January 17: 9:50-11:15**

**Location: Dome and Library**

This activity is intended for approximately 100 students. There will be room for 20 students per round table.

Students will choose to sit in one of 5 “Round Table” groupings. There is no assigned seating and students can choose to sit in whichever round table they want.

Each of our five speakers will be assigned to a table. Students will have an opportunity to ask questions during their time with each speaker. Speakers will rotate to other tables after a fifteen minute session. This will give each group of students a chance to interview each speaker.

In order to prepare for the Round Table you will need to prepare a list of questions that you think are important.

Listen carefully during the discussion and take in as much as you can and remember to take notes.
